"Mary's Calling; Our Calling"

4th Sunday of Advent [B] 2 Sm 7:1-5, 8-12, 14a, 16; Ps 89:2-5, 27, 29; Rom 16:25-27; Lk 1:26-38

Yesterday while flying into both Orlando and Cleveland airports

- the skies were largely clear
- until the last 1,000 feet of our approach to the runways
 - where foggy conditions were worse than forecasted.
- 500, 400, 300, 200 feet
 - o before finally seeing the approach lights
 - to continue in for a safe landing.
- It was a reminder of the faith we put in our technology and training.

Today we look at a deeper kind of faith – our faith in God.

In our first reading the prophet Nathan

- relayed to King David a message from God:
 - o that He would raise up another great king
 - from his descendants.
 - o God would "be a father to him
 - and he... a son" to the Father.
 - His kingdom and throne shall stand firm forever...
- I've always marveled at the faith of the Jewish people
 - for continuing to believe this prophecy...
 - o Century upon century looking forward to the birth of Christ.

After about 1,000 years, this prophecy would indeed come to fruition,

- and today we are at the very eve of celebrating
 - o the day when the Son of God, our king Jesus Christ, was born.

And it is on this 4th Sunday of Advent we read in today's Gospel

- this beautiful exchange between the archangel Gabriel and the Virgin Mary
- Where Gabriel reveals the rolling out of God's plan of salvation...
- A plan first alluded to by God all the way back in Genesis ch 3...

- o immediately after the fall of man...
- Where sin entered humanity thru Eve's disobedience
 - allowing the Serpent to wreak havoc on mankind,
- o God would enter humanity thru Mary's obedience
 - ultimately crushing the head of the Serpent.

We read today of this dramatic meeting between the angel Gabriel

- and the "New Eve" -- the Virgin Mary.
- A passage that is rich in topics we could discuss...
 - Gabriel's very unique greeting: "Hail, full of grace"
 - o and how it points to Mary's Immaculate Conception
 - How the Holy Spirit would "overshadow" Mary
 - o in the same way He had overshadowed His tabernacle
 - back in Exodus ch 40 (Ex 40:35)
 - The name of Jesus meaning "YWH saves"
 - o a name that contains both Christ's identity and mission

There is much we could delve into, but I'd like to focus today on Mary's faith

- on how Mary responded in her encounter with the angel Gabriel
 - How she responded to God's calling in her life, to her vocation

So often when we hear the word "Vocation"

- there's a tendency to immediately tune out:
 - o "Well, I'm not called to be a priest or a nun
 - so this talk obviously isn't for me..."

Well maybe you're <u>not</u> called to be a priest or a nun

but this message is still definitely for you...

For the reality is that each and every one of us -- without exception -

- much like Mary in today's Gospel, are called by God.
- Every single one of us has a Vocation in life (from the Latin: vocare, "to call")
 - God created you with a very specific purpose and mission

- and this is a call you should always be listening for.
- Some callings are quite unique
 - such as Mary's calling to be the mother of Jesus Christ
- Most are more or less common:
 - Holy Orders, Religious Life, Holy Matrimony, Consecrated Single Life

But Mary's response is worth meditating on

- for there is much we can learn from her example.
 - Much we can apply to our own lives.
- Mary's fiat is more than a beautiful story,
 - o it is a roadmap for us as we ponder God's calling...

Back Jan 1979, St. Pope John Paul II gave a homily at the Mexico City Cathedral

- where he identified four dimensions of Mary's Faith:
 - Search, Acceptance, Constancy & Consistency
- I'd like to take a look at these with you today.

1. Search

When Mary heard Gabriel's announcement of her life's calling to bear the Son of God

- her gears immediately began to turn and she wondered aloud:
 - O How can this be, since I have no relations with a man?
- Before addressing Mary's question, let us take a moment to look back earlier in this chapter...
- You may recall how, in the story immediately before this one in Luke ch 1, the angel Gabriel approached someone else about a miraculous birth...
 - o Gabriel told the elderly Zechariah that he & his barren wife Elizabeth
 - were going to conceive a son.
 - They were called to be the parents of John the Baptist.

- Zechariah said to Gabriel: "How shall I know this? For I am an old man, and my wife is advanced in years." (Lk 1:18) For this expression of disbelief,
 Zechariah was made mute until after John was born.
- But doesn't Zechariah saying, "How shall I know this? For I am an old man..." sound a lot like
- Mary saying to Gabriel, "How can this be since I have no relations with a man?" (Lk 1:34)?
- o The big difference here is that Zechariah truly doubted in his heart
 - that he & his wife would be able to conceive.
 - He did not trust in the power of God above the laws of nature.
- o The Immaculate Heart of Mary, however, knew no such doubt.
 - She was by no means questioning God's <u>ability</u>.
 - It simply was more of a wondering out loud,
 - an honest curiosity as to how God would bring this about,
 - since virginity and pregnancy are generally mutually exclusive...
- o Gabriel understood this and gave her an explanation of sorts.
 - With the Holy Spirit, virginity and divine maternity do not contradict each other;
 - on the contrary, they integrate perfectly. As he said, "With God, nothing is impossible." (Lk 1:37)

Secondly, Acceptance. Mary's wondering as to how God's will would be done

• very quickly became her Fiat: her Yes, Let it be done.

- "Behold I am the handmaid of the Lord. Be it done unto me according to thy word."
- Our Lady yields to God's will with prompt obedience, unreservedly.
- St. Pope John Paul II says this acceptance is the <u>crucial moment</u> of faithfulness,
 - the moment in which man perceives
 - he may never completely understand the 'how'
 - o that in God's plan there are often more areas of mystery than clarity.
- I am a woman and a virgin and yet... I shall be the Mother of God.
- I don't fully understand -- but my faith in God is beyond my understanding.
 - My answer is still a resounding Yes, "Be it done unto me according to thy word."

Next, John Paul reminds us that our callings must be lived with Consistency.

- After hearing and accepting God's calling, we must then set out to live our lives in accordance with that calling;
 - o to adapt one's life to the calling and mission you have been given.
- You may not have all the information up front...
 - Mary was simply told that her virginity was not incompatible
 - with giving birth to the Son of God.
 - She was not told up front:
 - How to explain her pregnancy out of wedlock to religious authorities.
 - How to explain this to her fiancé Joseph
 - What type of upbringing would they provide Jesus:
 - where to live, what to do,

- and a million other details.
- But Mary simply began marching with the word she was given
 - doing the best she could with prayerful discernment.
 - Listening for follow-on guidance day-by-day...

A week or so ago I was out doing some Christmas shopping and got to chatting with the store owner. He shared with me a story that I think is a great example of listening for the voice of God on a daily basis:

- You know how every year there's a toy that's the hottest thing on the market...
- Back in the mid-1980's, some of you may remember,
 - o the hottest toy on the market was the Cabbage Patch doll...
 - These cute, cuddly dolls were in high demand by kids of all ages
 - and were constantly sold out everywhere...
 - Well this guy had a friend in the toy business who
 - remarkably gave him 5 Cabbage Patch dolls! This was amazing!
 - He had 4 young daughters, so planned to give each of them a doll for Christmas. But what to do with the 5th doll?
 - o Then the thought came to him to go to a particular hospital with the doll.
 - No guidance beyond that.
 - o So he went, not sure where he was going when he got there
 - and ended up literally "randomly" entering a room down at the end of a long hallway...
 - He walked in and there was a sick little girl in the hospital bed
 - with her concerned parents at her bedside.

- He introduced himself and did his best trying to explain how he ended up there, ultimately saying,
 - "I think this doll is meant for you..."
 - Well the girl was elated, the parents crying
 - And the man emotional himself,
 - marveling at how God can work
 - thru the little things of our everyday lives
 - if only we are listening and willing to follow...
- 4. Lastly, and no less crucial, is <u>Constancy</u> faith that stands the test of time...

To this St. Pope John Paul II says:

• "All faithfulness must pass the most exacting test, that of <u>duration</u>... It's easy to be consistent for a day or two. It is <u>difficult</u> to be consistent for one's whole life. It is easy to be consistent in the hour of enthusiasm, it is difficult to be so in the hour of **tribulation**."

How do we respond when the magic or charm or excitement of our vocations fade?

• Do we fade with it or do we stay true to our calling..?

Today we are reminded thru this story of the calling of Mary

- that God has a calling for each of our lives too
 - Big blue-arrow type callings
 - that fundamentally change the direction of our lives.

- Am I called to be married or single or to the priesthood or religious life?
- Also, in our smaller, daily callings...
 - Like the shop owner whose story I shared
 - Whether at work or at school or with my family or alone
 - Am I listening and responding to that still small voice of the HS?
 - Or when I'm asked to volunteer around the parish?
 - Can I give even 1 hour a month to help out?

Today may we resolve to always listen for God's callings, big & small alike

- And may our response echo that of our Blessed Mother:
 - I may not fully understand how
 - o I may have a thousand smaller discernments along the way
 - o But my answer will always be the same, enthusiastic:
 - Yes, Lord, yes -- wherever you lead I will follow!
